Radioddity, a new ham radio equipment supplier.

With the new RV, I have gotten into Parks on the Air(POTA). Did my first activation in Sonoma County State Park a couple of weeks ago I useda Hustler whip on RV ladder and worked about a dozen folks, mostly 20 CW. It was lots of fun. I used my TS-2000. Then I decided to buy a new rig for the RV.

I ordered a Xiegu G1M(5W), XP125B 100w amp, and X6100(10w SDR) which were to ship in Feb. I Received the G1M within a week. The G1M had a firmware upgrade, which, after installing that did not work. So I sent email to Radioddity (they are in Hong Kong) and lo and behold a ham who is their rep in the States called me up. We went through the firmware update again and he declared the rig inoperative. I immediately got a refund on Pay-Pal. The rep was very good and told me that Xiegu is small (100 employees) and Radioddity is a bunch of young folks in Hong Kong.

I joined the Xiegu <u>GROUPS.IO</u> and watched all the YouTube videos on the X6100. The X6100 rig has great possibilities, especially at about \$650. It is a Linux based SDR which someone hacked about a week ago which means users can change the software, a two edged sword but a very powerful one.

The customer service was fast and superb. Keep them in mind!

Here's a note from Bob to Steve:


"Hi Steve,
